
What's Happening...

...In Kobe The 40th anniversary tree planted in Kobe's Harborland area is alive and growing! Cece and Andy Frank sent recent photos with their update on life in Kobe. The Franks (members of SKSCA - Andy is a former Chair) continue to be active in various pursuits: teaching English, filming commercials around Kansai, and traveling. You can email the Franks at: c-afrank@movenet.or.jp Here is some of what they have to say about what's happening in Kobe:

"There are many new developments going forward, including a very controversial Kobe Airport project in Osaka Bay, just off-shore of the second stage of Port Island. A very neat project has been the waterfront development in front of Tarumi and west to the big bridge at Maiko. The new marine park is called Kobe Marine Pia, and it is turning into a nice public recreational facility. In September, a restaurant complex known as Porto Bazarre (Spanish in style) opened up, and on October 1st a large factory outlet store building opened next to it. It has something like 32 outlets and 11 restaurants. The initial traffic has been very heavy, and people are buying.

"The business pick-up is now apparent across Kobe. Retail business appears to be picking up after several years of progressively weaker sales. We look at the downtown stores and for the first time in a couple of years we see people in most of the





shops, and a lot of people in the shopping streets are carrying packages. This is a considerable change, and it reflects recent expressions of confidence by leading businesses in surveys across Japan. Despite continuing problems, there seems to be a growing public perception that things will get better and that it's time to spend a little...and there is a certain vitality being generated in the financial and business community."

MARINERS REACH OUT TO JAPANESE FANS, COMMUNITY

"Going, going, good-bye baseball!!!"
The Seattle Mariners offer great opportunities to see some exciting baseball. Have you been to our new home, SAFECO Field? Blue sky, green grass, and a retractable roof - It's spectacular!

A Seattle establishment since 1977 and winners of the west division title of the American League in 1995 and 1997, the Seattle Mariners established a special relationship with Kobe, Japan in February 1998 when it signed a working agreement with the Kobe baseball team, the ORIX Blue Wave. For the last two years the Mariner Moose has visited Kobe and the Blue Wave's Neppie and Ripsea have come to Seattle. Last spring Ichiro Suzuki, a super star player, participated in the Mariners' spring training.

Now the Seattle Mariners have made it easier for Japanese-speaking fans and customers to access information about the team and SAFECO Field.

A Japanese Hotline (206-346-4317), Japanese language web information (www.mariners.org) and a direct e-mail link (japan@mariners.org) have been set up, all staffed by **Hide Sueyoshi**, the Japanese speaking Assistant to the Director of Pacific Rim Scouting for the Mariners, who will act as a translator and resource



for Japanese speaking media, residents and tourists seeking information about the team. A native of Osaka, Japan, Sueyoshi joined the Mariners in 1998. He has experience as an interpreter and liaison between Japan baseball and other countries. Previously, he

worked in the International Operations and scouting department of the Orix Baseball Club.

"With our recent signing of Japanese superstar pitcher **Kazuhiro Sasaki**, we expect there to be even more interest in the Mariners among Japanese media and fans than ever before. This is a service we can offer to reach out to our Japanese speaking fans and further strengthen our ties with the Japanese community," said **Chuck Armstrong**, President of the Seattle Mariners.

The Mariners web site will post all news releases distributed from the team in both English and Japanese. An archive of recent news releases is also available in the Japanese language.

The YMCA of Greater Seattle has 15 branches, three camps and 200-plus program sites, and positively impacts more than 171,000 people of all ages, races, faiths and economic backgrounds. It offers a wide variety of programs to "build strong kids, strong families and strong communities". Programs fall into the following categories: Aquatics, Camping, Childcare, Family, Health and Fitness, Older Adults, Teens, Youth and World.

The YMCA's international programs (Y World) have been an important part of its work over the years. The Seattle YMCA has a 30+ year partnership with the Kobe YMCA, thus the Y's interest in participating with and supporting SKSCA. YMCA programs with Kobe include youth exchanges, leadership academies and education. In 2000 the YMCA will send a group of high school students to the Philippines and Kobe for its second International Leadership Academy. The students prepare for several months to learn about the countries

they will visit and to plan their participation in community service projects. On their previous trip, students served dinner to victims of the Kobe earthquake still living in temporary housing. The Y will also receive several Kobe delegations in 2000 including an elementary youth group

and a group of social service agency executives that will study non-profit agency management and fund raising.

Tohru Yamaguchi, the General Secretary of the Kobe YMCA, will visit Seattle in April to participate in an exciting event in the history of the YMCA of Greater Seattle. On April 3, the YMCA will dedicate the totally renovated Seattle Downtown YMCA, at Fourth and Marion. The new YMCA includes a youth employment and education center, 20 transitional housing units for young adults, a 25 meter swimming pool, increased family counseling facilities, full-size gymnasium and enhanced wellness facilities for youth, family and adult health and fitness. This project is one of several being funded in part from the YMCA's recently completed "Step Up for Kids" campaign.
