


What's Happening...

Since its inception in 1974 as a part of the old North American Soccer League (NASL), the Seattle Sounders

have achieved unrivaled success. The Sounders have the Northwest's only back-to-back championships in professional sports history, winning the 1995 and 1996 A-League Championships.

Currently, the Sounders play at Seattle Memorial Stadium. The team has been known for its long history of community involvement in the Puget Sound region.

Seattle Sounders team member Kei Kinoshita is the first Japanese player to ever play professional soccer in the U.S. Kei was first noticed by the Seattle Sounders when he played for Vissel Kobe in the J-League from 1994 to 1996, during which time he tallied 63 points. Kei participated in the Seattle-Kobe Earthquake Benefit Matches in 1995 and 1996, which matched Vissel Kobe against the Sounders. Kei eventually landed a spot with the Sounders in 1998. After playing the 1998 season and then taking a year away from the team, he was signed as a free agent in March 2000. He has played as a pro for five years, two of which have been for Seattle.

Kei is a midfielder, who plays on the wings on

either the left or the right side. He is a versatile, speedy player and has spent time this season in the

> forward and defender positions. Kei is also active in the Seattle community with charitable and other worthy social efforts.


pand the Y's landmark 1930s facility in the heart of downtown Seattle.
