
Heading South on I-5

Janette sang many classic jazz songs and talked with the audience. It's a Small, Small World, Especially Between Seattle and Kobe!

Longtime SKSCA member Aurea Chittenden shared some great personal history with us during the visit of Kobe Jazz Vocalist Queen Janette Keiko Kawasjee. Aurea's sisters attended school with Janette, and their families were part of the same community. Aurea's mother, two sisters, and another of Janette's classmates, Maki, were able to have a mini-reunion with Janette at Dimitriou's Jazz Alley.

Aurea writes, "I joined SKSCA in 1980 because I was born and raised in Kobe. All my family is now in the Seattle area from Kobe, Japan. I was the first to come in 1963, and my 3 sisters, Irene, Isabel and Magadalena (Lena) followed. My parents came 20 years ago. My sisters and I graduated from Stella Maris Int'l School in Kobe, located in the Aotani area above Oji Zoo."

Aurea's Portuguese grandfathers came from Shanghai and Macau to Japan. Her grandmothers came from Yokohama and Awaji Island. Her father Theodorica Augusto de Jesus was born and raised in Kobe and went to St. Michael Int'l School. He passed away on June 19, 2000. Her mother Augusta Maher was born in Shizuoka and went to Japanese schools, Toyo Eiwa H.S. and Toyo Eiwa College in Tokyo. Aurea and her three sisters grew up in Kobe. Now the four sisters all live and work in the Seattle area. Irene and Isabel are both nurses, Lena is

a medical technologist and Aurea is a fiscal specialist. She visited Kobe in 1995 after the earthquake to visit her Japanese relatives. She lost one aunt and two uncles in the quake. She loves Kobe and Seattle because they are so similar.

Kobe Students Enjoy Seattle on the Kawasaki Junior High School Summer Program

This summer marked the fourth of five planned Kawasaki Junior High School Summer Programs held on the University of Washington campus and sponsored by the **Foundation for Interna**-

tional Understanding Through Students (FIUTS). The program is funded by a five-year grant from Kawasaki Heavy Industries, awarded on their 100th anniversary and designed to provide travel for sixty Japanese 8th graders each summer who suffered directly in the 1995 Kobe Earthquake. Each summer since 1997, 30 students have traveled to Seattle, and another 30 have visited Sydney, Australia.

The students all hail from Kobe and represent many schools, but all share a common eager anticipation and excitement for their time overseas. On the Seattle side, eight U.S. middle and high school students are selected to work as activity leaders for the program, creating a

This year the **Japanese Garden in the Washington Park Arboretum** celebrates its 40th Anniversary. When you go to enjoy the garden, look for the two stone lanterns which were donated by the City of Kobe early in the 1960's. The Okazaki or Turtle Lantern sits in the Woodland Grove and the striking Kasuga Lantern rests on the North Hill, commanding a full view of the garden. Someday the Japanese Garden Society hopes to realize the full vision of the Tokyo Metropolitan Park Department which imagined, planned, and installed the Garden in 1960.

The Japanese Garden is open March through November, 10 am until dusk. Admission is \$2.50 for adults, \$1.50 for children, students, and seniors. Self-guided and guided tours are available. For further information call **206 684-4725** or visit www.seattlejapanesegarden.org.
