based on responses to a request for public suggestions. The stadium is exclusively for ball games, and was designed to accommodate 42,000 spectators for the 2002 FIFA World Cup<sup>TM</sup>.

Now that the World Cup is over,

the stadium is to be remodeled to accommodate 34,000 spectators, with a closeable roof and an air-conditioning system equipped to reach every seat. The remodeling will also include the construction of a hot-water pool, athletic gymnasium and panoramic restaurant, providing a sports community park where many people can enjoy sports and friendly exchange. It will also play the role of a local disaster-protection site in case of an emergency.

### World Cup Soccer Reminiscences

#### The Beautiful Game

Around the world, soccer is known as "the beautiful game", and I was able to witness this first hand on my recent trip to Kobe. My uncle, cousin and I had planned our World Cup adventure for two years, where I would also introduce them to some Japanese culture. To give my relatives a true sense of Japan, I booked us into a Japanese hotel, where they could experience sleeping on the floor and walking around in yukata. Their immediate love of onsen [hot springs] surprised me most, but I was very happy, because we took full advantage of the three indoor and one outdoor onsen! The food throughout the trip was remarkable and though Seattle has a number of wonderful Japanese restaurants, it isn't quite the same as being in Japan.

We were totally impressed by Japan as a host country for the World Cup. The Japanese were well prepared and I could see huge improvements in internationalization and communication between Japanese and foreigners.

So many people came up to us and asked where we were from, and whom we wanted to win. I felt that all the years of working to promote international understanding in Japan have not been wasted. The JET Programme, amongst other programs, may have exposed the Japanese so that for the World Cup they could open up and show their true capabilities at international relations.

We had our own two stories of amazing kindness. In our hotel, they didn't have laundry services. A woman who had served us breakfast came in on her day off and took our laundry home and washed it. She wouldn't take a tip and the hotel would not take money for the service. It is hard to imagine many places in the world that would have a hotel whose employee would do this, and for free! Another time we forgot to return our hotel key and didn't realize it until

we had driven 45 minutes in a taxi. The taxi driver said he would take it back and when we tried to pay, he said no. I can think of no other taxi drivers in the world that would do this.

Aside from the wonderful hospitality and visits to historic locations like Himeji Castle and various places in Kyoto, we also saw five World Cup soccer games. It was an amazing and unforgettable trip. §

Seattle celebrated its 45th sister city anniversary with Kobe, Japan with a series of events from July 26-30, 2002. A 40-person delegation led by **Kobe Mayor Tatsuo Yada** and **Kobe City Council President Michihiro Yokoyama** visited Seattle and attended the 5th Annual Kobe Day with the Mariners event, opened a Kobe photo exhibit, marched in the SEAFAIR Torchlight Parade and held a business seminar on biotechnology opportunities in Kobe.

The delegation was a mix of government & business leaders, a group from the **Kobe City Women's Association** and Kobe Festival Representatives Mr. **Kazuhiko Ogiso** and Ms. **Hitomi Hamada**.

At the July 26 game at SAFECO Field, members and friends of the SKSCA created a 550-person cheering card section, spelling out "Ichiro" in Japanese, "Go Ichiro", "Go M's" and "Mariners" with large double-sided white and blue cards. The Port of Seattle is a major geographic gateway connecting passengers and cargo by air, water and land to destinations around the globe. As a public enterprise, the Port stimulates business activity to create long-term economic benefits for the people of King County, Washington, and builds transportation infrastructure that contributes to the vitality of the Pacific Northwest.

As a multifaceted public agency, the Port plays a key role in bringing international trade and travel to the region and supporting industries as diverse as tourism and commercial fishing.

A recent economic impact study showed that activities at Seattle's seaport and airport generate 165,000 jobs throughout the region with a total payroll in excess of \$5.5 billion. Business revenue from Port activities exceeds \$12 billion, and local purchases are worth \$1.3 billion. Over \$660 million in state and local tax revenues are generated by the Port's activities.

But the Port isn't only about dollars and jobs. Part of what the Port brings to the region is accessibility – the ability for travelers to go where they choose, when they choose, for business and pleasure.

Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, the nation's

17th-busiest, saw more than 27 the new central terminal and concourses that, by the 2004 completion, will keep passengers and airline customers coming back.

The Port's passenger cruise terminals will welcome more than a quarter of a million cruise visitors per year in 2003 and beyond. The Port is also a key sponsor of a regional freight action strategy to separate road and rail traffic and keep people and cargo moving.
