



Every year since 2000, the winner of the Kobe Jazz Vocalist Queen Contest held in Kobe's Shinkaichi neighborhood, the birthplace of Japanese jazz, has

visited Seattle to perform at **Dimitriou's Jazz Alley**. Now the SKSCA is developing a reciprocal program: a contest to send two female jazz vocalists from Seattle to perform in Kobe! Two vocalists will be selected, one high school student and one adult.

The semifinalists (seven adults and four high school students) were chosen based on their applications and taped performances. They will perform in a live competition at Dimitriou's Jazz Alley (2033 6th Ave, Seattle) on Saturday April 16. The high school students will perform from 9:20 – 10:20 am, and the adults will perform from 10:25 – 11:55 am. Winners will be announced at 1:15 pm. The winners of this final

competition will win an expenses-paid trip to Kobe to perform in a jazz concert being held on October 1, 2005 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the birth of jazz in Japan and to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the Great-Hanshin Awaji Earthquake. Come on down to hear these talented performers and support this new exchange activity!

Kobe Earthquake 10th Anniversary Remembrance Ceremony and Bell Ringing

Seattle Mayor Greg Nickels, Consul General of Japan Kazuo Tanaka, Seattle-Kobe Sister City Association President Karin Zaugg, Kobe Trade Information Office Director Takeshi Yamamoto and over 70 members and friends of the Seattle-Kobe Sister City Association gathered at 12:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 16, 2005, to mark the 10th anniversary of the Kobe Earthquake and remember the victims of that tremendous disaster. After remarks by Ms. Zaugg, Mayor Nickels, Consul General

Tanaka and Mr. Yamamoto, three candles were lit in bamboo holders shipped from Kobe. The words inscribed on these holders were "Inori" (a prayer), "Tsuito" (to mourn), and "Kizuna" (a bond). (See related story, next page.) The crowd then observed a moment of silence at exactly 12:46 p.m., which corresponds to the time the earth-

quake struck in Kobe, at 5:46 am on January 17th.

Those in attendance then took turns ringing the bell in memory of the earthquake victims ten years ago. The sound of the bell ringing over the Seattle Center was a beautiful reminder of how our mutual support can truly resonate across an ocean.

SKSCA Marks 10th Anniversary of Kobe Earthquake with Ceremonial Bamboo Candle Holder Exchange with Kobe

The SKSCA sent 16 ceremonial bamboo candle holders to Kobe for use in ceremonies commemorating the 10th anniversary of the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake at 5:46 a.m. on January 17, 2005 in Kobe. The ceremony in Kobe used 6,433 of these bamboo holders (the number of people who perished in the earthquake) to spell out the numbers 1 – 17 for January 17th. Messages on bamboo holders have been sent to Kobe from around Japan in past years, but this was the first time for holders to be sent from outside of Japan.

The candle holders sent from Seattle were signed by more



than 250 people from 16 organizations active in the Seattle-Kobe sister city relationship, and included messages like "we remember with you,"

"energy, strength, tenacity," "peace," "hope," and "eternal friendship." Signers included Seattle Mayor Greg Nickels, City Councilmember Jim Compton (council liaison to the SKSCA), all of the Port of Seattle commissioners, heads and staff of the Trade Development Alliance, Greater Seattle Chamber of Commerce, Seattle Yacht Club, Seattle Mariners, YMCA, SEAFAIR, University of Washington, Rotary Club #4, the Seattle Cherry Blossom and Japanese Cultural Festival, Japan-America Society of the State of Washington, SKSCA, Seattle Art Museum, and Dimitriou's Jazz Alley, and students of the John Stanford International School.

Students at the John Stanford School also had a chance to watch a video on the earthquake. After watching the video, 1st grader **Kyle Weber** of the Japanese immersion program wrote in Japanese on the bamboo: "Mina-san, shiawase ni narimasu

yo ni 6,000 nin ijo no hito ga nakunatte, kanashii desu." (Everyone in Kobe – I hope you are well. I'm so sad that more than 6,000 people died.)

In exchange for the holders sent from Seattle, the citizens of Kobe sent three bamboo holders for use in our remembrance ceremony here. The words inscribed on these holders were "Inori" (a prayer), "Tsuito" (to mourn), and "Kizuna" (a bond). These were signed by all who attended the



remembrance ceremony at the Kobe Bell, which was held at 12:46 p.m. on January 16 (to coincide with ceremonies being held in Japan).

Shipping of the bamboo both ways was provided by **Nihon Yusen NYK** in support of the sister city and sister port relationships between Seattle and Kobe. The arrival of our bamboo in Kobe was covered extensively in the local Kobe media.

A Letter from Mayor Yada

Dear Ms. Zaugg,

"Please allow me to thank you for attending the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake 10-Year Memorial along with Mayor Nickels. I would also like to thank everyone at the Seattle-Kobe Sister City Association for your tireless efforts in arranging this ceremony.



This January 17th marked a major turning point for us, the 10th anniversary since the earthquake. As such, there have been a number of commemorative events in Kobe. I understand that in our far-away sister city of Seattle, you too commemorated the earthquake by ringing the Kobe Bell at the same time when the earthquake occurred. This was profoundly moving for myself and the people of Kobe.

In coming upon the 50th anniversary of sister city ties between our two cities in 2007, I hope that on many levels and through many forms, the friendship between the people of Seattle and the people of Kobe will continue to deepen.

Please accept my best wishes for the prosperity of all members of the Seattle-Kobe Sister City Association."

Emerging Biomedical Innovation System in Kobe

We have all heard about the powerful earthquake that rocked Kobe in 1995, killing thousands and shattering the economy of one of Japan's most vibrant cities. But did you know that



even today, a decade later, economic output remains 20 percent below pre-quake levels? Realizing that much of the city's lost industrial output would never return, a small group of local leaders hatched a plan in 1998 to develop the city as an international hub for biomedical research and innovation. Out of this was born the **Kobe Medical In-**

dustry Development Project. Housed on part of a manmade island, the project integrates basic, applied, clinical, and translational research in regenerative medicine and biomedical equipment, providing a comprehensive platform for research, development, and commercialization of new medical therapies and technologies.

On February 9, Dr. Steven Collins of the University of Washington (Bothell Campus) introduced residents of Washington State to this important biomedical innovation system in Seattle's sister city and the implications for future collaboration between our two regions. Collins is completing The Race to Commercialize Biotechnology: Molecules, Market and the State in Japan and the U.S. to be published by Routledge Press.
