The judges selected **Ms. Greta Matassa** and **Ms. Katherine Stuber** to represent Seattle at the 10th Annual Kobe Jazz Queen Contest on May 9, 2009 in Kobe, Japan.



Ms. Matassa is a professional vocalist who has performed throughout the Puget Sound region. Overseas, her singing credits include Russia, Singapore and now Japan. In 2009, Greta Matassa was voted "Northwest Vocalist of the Year" by Earshot Jazz and gets regular national airplay. Ms. Stuber is a sophomore at Roosevelt High School

who has been recognized as an outstanding vocalist at several jazz festivals throughout the region. She has also performed regionally at such places as the Triple Door, Tula's and Bake's Place.

Cultural Immersion Program Sends Students to Kobe

Students from Seattle's University Prep High School traveled to Kobe this April, 2009, as part of the school's Global Link program. For students Brittany Carrol-Watts, Jen Reynolds, Colin Rice, and Tony Walls, this was much more than a sightseeing trip; it was total cultural immersion. Not only did the students stay with host families, attend school at Keimei High School, but they also had to give up their cell phones, their iPods and anything else connecting them back home to Seattle. This communication blackout, which included phone calls and emails back to parents, is a key aspect of the University Prep's program and is designed for better cultural immersion. The two adult leaders, Sarah Peterson and

Nathan Eddings, checked in daily back home with updates and to share stories with the families. During their stay, students researched Japanese culture, religion, art and US/Japan relations (specifically the relationship between Seattle and Kobe) as part of an overall academic theme of Peace Studies.

One of the trip's highlights was a one-night stay at Engyoji, the mountaintop temple complex used as the set for the film, *The Last Samurai*. Students took a private tour led by the temple monks and were granted access to temple buildings and artifacts otherwise closed to the public. After exploring the complex, they enjoyed a vegetarian meal and a Zen meditation session under the moonlight.

Students also studied the Great Hanshin Earthquake of 1995 and its devastating effect on the city, the national and international response, and the relief effort. Kobe city residents, in conjunction with the Silver City College, held a symposium with the

students to share personal earthquake experiences and to discuss the importance of international relief effort. The Asahi newspaper ran a story about the event along with a full color photo on the front page of its Kobe section.

The Kobe-Seattle Sister City Association (KSSCA) played a large role in creating the schedule, finding host families and planning events. Thanks to the KSSCA, the group enjoyed cherry blossoms at Himeji castle, attended a Kobe Vissel professional soccer game, and had countless other extraordinary experiences. Many thanks to all of the host families, the volunteers and Keimei school for such a memorable trip!

GOING NORTH ON I-5

Take the Lynnwood 44th Ave. exit (Exit #181) Turn left and go north on 44th Ave. for 2.3 miles to the light at

168th (Kev Bank).

Turn left here onto 168th St., and go west, across Hwy 99, for 1.4 miles.

(Stay in the right hand lane, which jogs right at the stop light just past the high school.) Turn right at stop sign onto 66th Ave. and go one block. (Meadowdale Park will be on your left.) Turn left onto Meadowdale Road (which starts to wind down to the water) and go 1/4 mile. Take the first left up a hill onto 164th St. and proceed for one long block.

At 1st stop sign at 72nd Ave, jog left for ½ block, and then right onto 164th Place. Follow this to our house with two pointed roofs at the end of a cul-de-sac.
